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ANZAC DAY

As is normally the case, ANZAC DAY falls within our term break. All students, not just SRC, are invited to march with me and other staff on April 25. Please meet near Tandoori Guru just after 10am. Students will acknowledge this special day back at school during Week 1.

Holy Thursday Finish

Students are dismissed at 12:30pm on Holy Thursday. You may ask why we have early finishes on some days, pupil free days on another or how we come up with when the bell goes to start and end the day because all schools have different procedures. In short, it is centred around the Enterprise Agreement that is in place for staff. This determines how much face to face teaching a teacher can have over the year or term and how long their breaks are during the week and also how many relief lessons a teacher can take. There are even guidelines around yard

duties and staff meetings. To keep to the prescribed amount, we sometimes need to have an early finish at the end of term. Our pupil free days also allow us to complete whole staff training, which under the guidelines, would be hard to do after school especially if the trainer is from Adelaide.

NAPLAN

Early next term the college conducts the nationwide NAPLAN tests. We are doing this online for the first official time. Last year we trialled it online but this year is the real deal. If your child is in Year 3, 5, 7 or 9, then you should have received some information already around what to expect. Students do get to practice online and Year 3 have special changes to their testing.

I wish you all the Blessings of Easter - Hope, Love and Joy! I also invite you to the liturgy of the Stations of the Cross on Saint John's Campus oval on Good Friday.

In this Holy Week we will again hear in a more deliberate, specific and detailed liturgy of the Church the story of love which has inspired and compelled many to offer their life in love for others. Holy Week is a wonderful retelling of a story of love, not just of someone but of the One who gave life to the world and the universe – God in the person of Jesus Christ. “For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.” Jn 3:16

Religious Dimension

Peace this Easter

Last weekend on the program Sunday Night on Channel 7 there was an investigative report on the scientific search for the existence of God. It also explored whether a sample of blood discovered was the actual blood of Christ. I turned it off after about 2 minutes.

Apart from being a ratings exercise and a piece to satisfy the timeslot in the approach to Easter my conclusions about the scientific existence of God or if the blood was actually Jesus' is, 'who cares'?

The reason for my conclusion is that Easter is about faith. It is about living in the 'Light' of the risen Christ. We have been through a long and renewing period of Lent. We have come to the point in the church year where all Christian denominations celebrate and give praise to God for choosing us to be people of God. God gave us hope and redemption through the suffering, death and resurrection of the Son of God in the person of Jesus Christ. So if the blood in this program is or isn't Christ's blood is really of no concern.

Jesus is himself a new covenant, or binding agreement, between ourselves and God (The New Testament version of the burning bush or the rainbow). This agreement, as far as I see it, is that if we live with Jesus in our hearts seeking peace, love, compassion, understanding, forgiveness and a place for the stranger, then God will be there for us.

To ask if some remains or artefacts are a scientific proof of Jesus' existence is not the question we should be asking. We also will not receive any joy if we ask these questions from a historical, anthropological or literary perspective. Each of these academic fields in their own right are integral components to help us understand

the world and universe in which we live. They help us explore our faith, humanity and place in the world, but alone they do not provide 'the' answer.

The only way we can find real answers about God is to ask these questions in the light of faith; "is this the actual place of Christ's crucifixion?" Scientifically or historically the answer is most likely no. As a matter of faith and belief, the answer is a definitive yes! The truth of Faith is the only truth we can be sure of acquiring to these questions.

We should also not look at the Easter story as a good historical tale. Something that we recall once a year to test its vigour and validity.

Easter is to be lived and understood in the here and now. How can we make the story of Easter come alive today in our hearts, our homes, our communities and in the whole world? These are the answers we should be looking for at Easter.

With the events in the Middle East over the last week or so, I think we need some Easter hope in the world at the moment.

So this Easter I wish all our families a holy and safe Easter. Enjoy this special time together with your family and I pray you are blessed by the presence of the risen Christ in your lives.

There are many Easter celebrations in all churches in Whyalla this weekend. It is here we should be looking for the existence of God.

Happy Easter everyone.

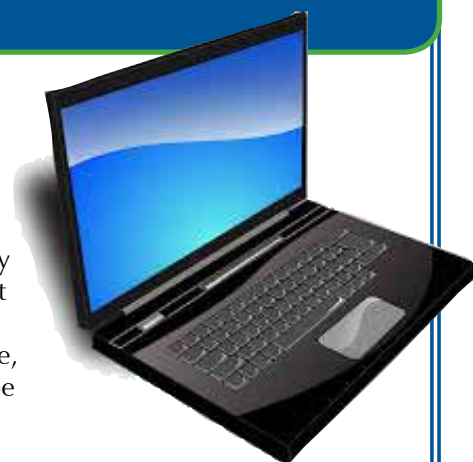
BYOD

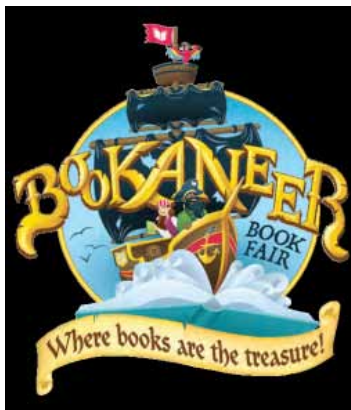
Bookaneer Book Fair
