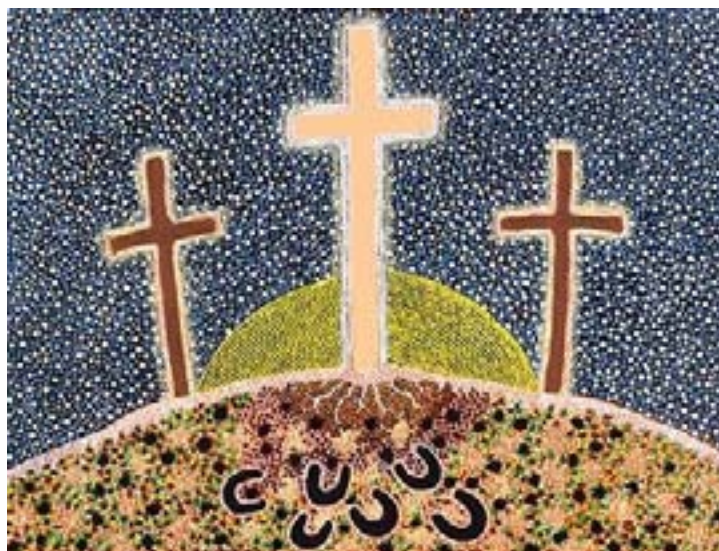

Last week I had the privilege to spend three days with fourteen other principals of Catholic schools together with some outstanding Retreat leaders including two aboriginal leaders from interstate. The three days took us all into spaces we would rarely explore and to enjoy experiences of the land and sea combined with reflections on reconciliation, prayer, symbolism and deep listening. The retreat was designed to allow principals to be nourished and given time to the quiet voice of God be heard in them through an encounter with the sacred in Aboriginal spirituality.

Parish News

Looking back over the last two weeks in our parish life coming first to my mind is the beautiful celebration of the Feast of the Sacred Heart. Congratulations to the Year 7s and their teachers who prepared the Liturgy. Through the clarity of their readings, prayers of the Faithful, appropriately chosen hymns and graphic presentation of the Feast Day symbolism the meaning of the feast was made clearer to all present. This symbolism, the students explained, shows us that the second Person of the Trinity by becoming truly human, the Word Incarnate, revealed the immense love of His Father for each of us. Thank you, Year 7s.

Last weekend Fr Jim in his homily on the Gospel of the day developed a similar theme as he rejected any discrimination against those who are mentally or physically challenged, noting at the same time we all have one or more disabilities. Fr Jim said: "Today's gospel is indiscriminate – it covers all people – everyone. God our creator, who is also the creator of all of those who are not quite like the norm – whatever that is – knows how many hairs there are on each one's head, an example that underlines how well He knows and cherishes each person, no matter who they are."

Another joyous parish occasion was the First Holy Communion of our young parishioners celebrated at each of our parish Masses on June 17 and 18, and again last Saturday night. May this personal encounter with Jesus lead each child to realise how she or he is valued by Jesus.

Then during the week past, we had a party to honour the members of our Catholic Women's League who for half a century have assisted so many and devotedly served the Church community – their cakes and scones are legendary! Congratulations and thanks to these wonderful women.

Last week too was designated as Refugee Week, a reminder of the support needed to assist those fleeing war, persecution and extreme poverty. Thanks to the students who prepared posters for display. Refugee Week also serves as a reminder that Australia is still holding refugees and asylum seekers including children in detention on Manus Island and on Nauru. The UN Refugee Council last week again spoke out against this policy.

Year of Youth

Each year the Australian Bishops announce a theme for the year. In 2018 the theme is The Year of Youth. The following information is from the website <http://youth.catholic.org.au/projects/year-of-youth>

The Australian Bishops have identified the liturgical year of 2018, beginning on the first Sunday of Advent (3 December 2017), as a national Year of Youth.

The Year of Youth invites the church into dialogue about the importance and life-giving presence of young people in the Church and society. It calls for dialogue and active engagement focused on the reconnection and renewal of a new generation of young people in the life of the Church.

The Year of Youth aims to:

- prayerfully discern the Australian Bishops vision for ministry with young people, Anointed and Sent;
- authentic and personal engagement by Church leaders in the challenges and success in young people's lives;
- acknowledging the Holy Spirit at work in the lives of young people, and young people acting upon the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church; and
- upholding the dignity of young people, ensuring a safe environment from physical, emotional and spiritual harm.

The Year of Youth is focused on local renewal and engagement.

To help with planning and organisation of the Year of Youth events and directions, a survey is being conducted to gather the views of young people from 16 to 29 on a range of youth centered issues in society and the church. I encourage young people to have a look at the survey and complete it.

Examinations

Our Year 12 students have just over 1 term of school left. For some of these students the 3rd Term starts with Examinations. Here are "10 Rules of Good Studying", from a book "How to excel at Maths and Science, even if you flunked algebra".

1. Use Recall. After you read a page look away and recall the main ideas.
Try and recall those main ideas when you are walking to class or in a different environment.
2. Test Yourself. On everything. All the time. Flashcards are your friend.
3. Chunk Your Problems. After you have solved a problem rehearse it. Your trying to make the processes one smooth chunk that you can recall when needed.
4. Space your repetition. Spread out your learning in the subject a little every day, just like an athlete. Your brain is like a muscle – it can handle only a limited amount of exercise on the same subject at a time.
5. Alternate different problem solving techniques during your practice. Never practice too long at any one session using only one problem-solving technique. Mixing it up helps you to learn how and when to use the different techniques.
6. Take breaks. It is common to be unable to solve problems or figure out concepts in Maths and Science the first time you encounter them. When you get frustrated take a 25 minute break, this allows your brain to continue to work through the problem without you having to focus on it.
7. Use explanatory questioning and simple analogies. When you are struggling with a concept, think to yourself, How can I explain this so a 10 year old could understand?
8. Focus. Turn off all interrupting beeps and alarms on your phone and computer and then turn on a timer for 25 minutes. Focus intently for these 25 minutes and try to work as diligently as you can.
9. Eat your frogs first. Do the hardest things earliest in the day, when you are fresh.
10. Create a picture or description of your dream. Place this somewhere prominent where you study. Look at this when you feel your motivation lagging.

Term 3 Changes in Staffing

Trent Keiper will finish his time with us at the end of this term. Trent has worked at Samaritan College since 2006, and over the years has taken on a number of different roles, including Sports and Physical Education Coordinator and Year Level Coordinator. Within each role Trent ensured that he was doing what was best for our students, always taking time to listen and guide those who sought his support. His experiences lead him into the area of counselling and for the last few years he has undertaken studies to move into this area in a full-time capacity.

No school likes to have teachers leave part way through the year, but an opportunity presented itself for Trent that was exactly what he was looking for, he will continue to work in the region helping young people get back into the world of work. We wish Trent all the best with this new chapter in his life.

To replace Trent there have been a few changes. Cristina Torres will pick up the Year 12 General Maths class, teaching one of the classes already places her in the best position to pick up the second. Tariro Nodoro will pick up the Year 10 General Maths, and Maresa Lyons will return to the classroom to pick up Year 11 and junior Maths classes. Trent's two Year 8 PE classes will be taken by either Ryan Baker or Karina Van De Wiel.
