Term Three is the term when the Human Sexuality unit of our Made in the Image of God (MITIOG) program is taught. A letter explaining what we teach can be found on our website with links to the curriculum content of this statewide Catholic program. There are many myths around what Catholic schools do and don't teach in regard to Human Sexuality and it is worth taking the time to look at what the course actually entails for your child's age group. The letter also outlines who to contact should you have any further questions.

We recently posted on our Facebook page a reminder that at any stage during the year, especially in winter, we may have students diagnosed with influenza. We do find that there are occasions when these students have been sent to school even though they are clearly ill. When the illness is communicable, such as flu, it is vital that the student remains at home until there has been no fever for at least 24 hours.

Parish News

I heard of one of our students who, for his birthday party, requested that his guests bring a donation for Project Compassion, instead of a birthday present. A month later another student similarly transformed her birthday into an expression of the kingdom of God by asking her friends to bring a present for St Vincent de Paul Society to give to children of needy families.

In another parish on supply duties recently, I listened to some parents talking in disparaging terms about the – as they thought - inadequate material resources of the local Catholic school. "What do you get for your money?" one commented, as the other agreed.

It dawned on me that this is precisely the reason we have a Catholic school in our communities. As followers of Jesus Christ, we owe it to the parents in each community to provide them with an option. What sort of human being do you want your child to grow up to be? Is the extent of one's material possessions the criterion for a fulfilling life? Or would we like our children to grow up as compassionate people, who understand material goods as an opportunity to share with the needy? Would we prefer that our kids develop into people who trust in God's love and grace, or who find meaning in having lots of stuff? What would you rather have, when this life is ending – lots of things, or a

strong friendship with the God of life?

"Happy are they who trust in the Lord", says the psalmist. Happiness in the scriptures is associated with wisdom. On Tuesday we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of Our Lady. In both the Catholic and Orthodox traditions, there is no record of the death of Mary, the mother of Jesus. With the Christians of the Orthodox tradition, we revere this woman, the first to be moved by the Holy Spirit in the New Testament. Mary manifested true wisdom by accepting what God asked her to do, in becoming the Mother of the Word of God. In the feast of the Assumption, we reflect on the awesome power of God. God used Mary to help us understand how the power of the Resurrection would be applied, for all who happily place their trust in God, rather than in material things. I'm glad that "Wisdom" is part of our College motto!

Religious Dimension

This week there are two important events which contribute to the Catholic School identity of Samaritan College.



The first fell on Tuesday, August 8 with the Feast of Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop. Saint Mary of the Cross was a religious woman who dedicated her life to the service of God. She carried out her ministry by educating the poor and addressing the needs of women in difficult situations. She had a vocation that was inspired by the teaching of Jesus and a love of God. Mary looked at her world and saw where things needed to be done and worked for justice and dignity. Along the way many other women were inspired by her work and joined the Religious Sisters of Saint Joseph. We know them affectionately as the Josephites.

On the August 15 our school and all the schools in

our diocese will celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of Mary, Mother of Jesus. In Whyalla we use the title of Mary, Help of Christians and in other parts of the world Mary is given many different titles. Ex Saint Teresa's students may remember Our Lady of Fatima, Our Lady of Lourdes and Our Lady of Mt Carmel. Before Samaritan College these were the names of the St Teresa's sports teams. Our Catholic tradition is that we pray through Mary and ask her to take our needs or petitions to God on our behalf (Help of Christians).



Mary's acceptance of God's will to be the Mother of God Incarnate, her devotion to Jesus and her unyielding faith make her a beautiful example for all.

Many Year 7 students will begin their preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation this week. These two feast days will help these students identify qualities that they

can admire and try to display themselves as they grow in the life of the church and their communities.

The Saints 'point' us in the direction of a life with Jesus. We can use their example to discern how we can try to live as Jesus teaches. Many Saints are described as faithful, giving, sharing, loving, patient, honest, kind and so on. It is these qualities that we try to demonstrate in our own lives and we ask the Saints to show us how this can be done.

As the Saints lived their lives, they went out into the ordinary world and became the hands, eyes and mouth of Christ. They carried out their work of love, justice and faith with their hearts set firmly on the will of God.

Made in the Image of God - Human Sexuality Program Keeping Safe - Child Protection Curriculum

Dear Families,

Made in the Image of God is the mandated Human Sexuality program for South Australian Catholic Schools. This program has four learning areas in which the students in Catholic schools investigate aspects of human relationships.

The areas of learning are Being Human, Being Sexual, Being Moral and Being Connected.

In Term 3 the focus area of learning is Being Sexual. The content of the Being Sexual Unit for each year level varies depending on the age of the students and the Year Level they are in. If you would like more information about specific topics for your child's Year level, please contact me or your child's RE teacher.

The topics in the Being Sexual unit are taught in a manner that promotes and encourages behaviours founded on Catholic values. This is achieved by exploring the spiritual, physical and moral dimensions of human sexuality and developing an appreciation of the Catholic Church teaching regarding sexuality which is a gift from God.

This term in conjunction with the Human Sexuality program the college will be delivering the **Keeping Safe-Child Protection Curriculum**. This program is also required to be taught by schools in South Australia and is designed to help children, in conjunction with responsible adults, remain safe in their community.

The areas of learning in the Child Protection Curriculum are **The Right to be Safe, Relationships, Recognising and Reporting Abuse and Protective Strategies**. This term the focus area for the Child Protection Curriculum is **Recognising and Reporting Abuse**.

The themes that are explored in the topic of Recognising and Reporting Abuse include;

Recognising Abuse
Identifying Abuse and Neglect
Electronic Media

Issues about privacy, secrets and trust are also explored so as to keep children safe. Again the topics and the language used by teachers are tailored to suit the needs of the children in a particular year level and taught with respect and diligence.

If you have any queries or concerns regarding the teaching of the Being Sexual component of the Made in the Image of God program or the Child Protection Curriculum, do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher.
