# Social Media

Some families may not be aware but all staff in South Australian schools (not just Catholic schools) follow this document in relation to Protective Practices i.e. how staff 'behave' with students or interact with students. It can cover things right to down basics i.e. keeping a door open when meeting individually with a student to more complex

protection matters, especially in country towns where staff may play sport with students or have students as close friends due to the relationship between the staff member and their parents and so on. One particular area that is an absolute 'no' for staff, is for them to be 'friends' (or similar) on social media with students or interact with them on social media (in whatever form that takes). Regardless of whether it is school related or harmless chat, it is not OK. Monitoring that, however, can be difficult and we do need parents to continue to check who their child is interacting with online - not just school staff. If you find someone you do not know, please challenge your child as to who that person is. This would also apply to 'group chats' your child may be in a number of 'group chats' with students from school - it can be helpful to check the topic of these chats or what images may be getting shared. The other challenge for staff, is that they can get weekly even daily 'friend' requests from students. Whilst the staff member would politely decline or simply ignore the request, it can be helpful for parents to discuss this with their child as to why they cannot or should not seek out school staff to be 'friends' online. SEQTA or school email are the only two electronic communications staff should be using to communicate with your child. The document that covers all this can be found here: Protective practices for staff in their interactions with children and young people guidelines for staff working or volunteering in education or care settings.

# **Year 7 Camp**

Welcome back to the Year 7 campers who had a great few days at the traditional Year 7 Aquatic camp location at Port Vincent. Some of you may have been aware that a large shark was seen in and around Port Vincent a week before our campers were due to arrive. The Aquatics section of the camp is run by the Department for Education and they adjusted their program and put in other changes to manage risk – even though no sighting had been recorded for nearly a week. They kept the school informed of their risk management processes and we signed off as being satisfied with the changes. This sort of liaising happens regularly and many camps and excursions have to have Plan Bs in their Risk Management plan especially those that go during fire ban season. Some Plan Bs include not going at all.

## **CESA Executive Team Visit**

On May 19, we will have the full Catholic Education SA Leadership team visit Samaritan. This is the team that leads/runs all of Catholic Education SA (separate to the SA Commission for Catholic Schools which includes the Archbishop and Bishop). They are seeking to hold some of their regular leadership meetings outside of their usual location in Thebarton and get out to the country schools – with us having an airport nearby and with our local major employer making national headlines, we were an obvious choice.

# **Student Accident Insurance**

All students attending Samaritan College that sustain any injuries as the result of an accident that occurs at school or on a school organised activity, are covered under the Catholic Education Student Accident insurance policy.

Insurance cover includes payments for medical services where that service is not already covered by Medicare. Depending on the type of injury, a lump sum payment may also be provided.

It is important to note that the policy only covers ACCIDENTS. If an ambulance is called for a health related issue (seizure, anaphylactic, diabetes etc), the ambulance is not covered under this policy. Families of children with pre-existing conditions

should always be encouraged to hold their own ambulance insurance.

To make a claim you can access the claim form <u>here</u> and complete all sections up to Page 5. The forms can then be forwarded to your campus Administration with copies of relevant medical reports. The college will complete the remainder of the form and submit on your behalf.

# **Deputy News**

For avid readers of our newsletter, you may recall some information last year about a new behaviour education program introduced at secondary called, Positive Behavioural Interventions and Support (PBIS). This program is now being deployed at primary with the following leadership team.

PBIS is the application of behavioural science in schools. It's a way of getting organised about behaviour and treating it much like a subject (we plan, we teach, we evaluate, we collect data etc). In much the same way we scaffold curriculum to suit varied learning needs, PBIS is also scaffolded using a multitiered continuum of support. We layer more intensive environmental supports to increase the likelihood students are academically, emotionally and socially successful.

PBIS is not about changing students – we cannot 'make' students learn or behave. PBIS is about changing the environment to make it more likely that students will succeed, both academically and socially/emotionally.

At our pupil free day last week, primary staff gathered to start implementing key ideas of the PBIS framework. They were asked to develop some school wide values – broad guiding principles, valued

behaviours and attitudes for students to experience success at school. Classroom rules/expectations are then constructed from the values. These rules/expectations are then explicitly taught by the teacher to create positive, consistent and equitable classroom environments.

The draft primary campus expectations are...

Be Responsible

Be Respectful

Be Kind

Be Brave

The school advisory board will soon be presented with a draft Matrix of these expectations for consultation and further development. I look forward to sharing more updates in subsequent newsletters.






















# **Anzac Day liturgies**
